	This introduction into Cultural Anthropology will define concepts of culture along with aspects of culturral learning and becoming through lived processes. The course will cover themes such as the environment, forms of economy, religion, language, kinship, politics, psyche (conscience and decision making) worldview and ways of thinking and will clarify their relationship to culture. In practical exercises (ethno- graphic interviewing, participant observation) and case studies, students will learn about anthropological research methods and theories esp. those of great relevance for theology and mission studies such as the Anthropology of Christianity.

	 the Christian message (e.g. aspects of culture related to suffering and death, to conscience, guilt and shame, to sin and the moral order, to personal and social ethics, to forgiveness of the debt of sin, cleansing from the defilement of sin, to redemptive analogies, etc.). 4) Contextualize: the gospel message and to contextualize one's ministry in a fashion which is based on the authority of Scripture but sensitively related to the social and cultural context because it is also based on an adequate understanding of the human ministry context. 5) Use: the tools of ethnographic inquiry and fieldwork to acquire social and cultural understandings to inform subsequent ministry activity.
	6) Develop: the ability to carry out small-scale ethnographic research projects to inform pastoral and/or missionary practice and thereby come to a better understanding of those one is ministering to.
